Library service engagement with individuals and with the wider community drives benefits in many of the Welsh Government's priority areas such as prosperity, resilience, equality, cohesive communities, culture, learning and health and well-being.

The proposal for assessment is a temporary reduction to the Caerphilly Library Service Resource Budget by 20%, equating to a financial reduction of £57,000.

The temporary savings will be achieved by introducing a number of library service acquisition and operational changes to all new purchased items in all stock categories, including eDigital titles, by reducing all expenditure lines in order to meet the saving required.

### We plan to:

Reduce the number of hardback and paperback books purchased through the financial year in all age groups and categories.

Reduce the customer request budget expenditure lines by placing strict criteria and further scrutiny on the policy guidance around requested library stock.

Reduce the number of Large Print and Audiobook Standing Order Plans ordered at the beginning of each financial year.

Cancel the purchase of all adult and children DVDs.

Postpone the purchase of all children's Audiobooks subject to review.

Consider and scrutinise, considering best value the purchase of high requested eBooks and eAudiobooks titles reserved by Caerphilly users on the Borrowbox website.

Consider and scrutinise, considering best value and societal needs, future eDigital services e.g. eNewspapers.

Permanently reduce the number of copies of Reference titles held at Hub library branches.

Increase the reservation ratio of super seller items from 1/10 to 1/15 – allowing 15 reservations to be placed on a single item before a further copy needs to be purchased.

Consider and scrutinise more closely the acquisition of library stock and products required to support UK, Welsh, regional and CCBC services and partners. Examples include CCBC Ukrainian Guests, Basic Skills, NHS Wales, The Reading Agency Reading Well collections, Empathy Lab etc.

Consider the acquisition of library stock and products used to support targeted library themed stock displays and reading initiatives, for example WOW, library and community Reading Groups, author visits, TV Tie-ins, one-off marketing project which achieve widespread but short-lived popularity etc.

Reduce the purchase of the promotional materials, prizes and support book stock that requires purchase in order to undertake the annual UK-wide Reading Agency Summer Reading Challenge.

Reduce craft materials budget used to support library run sessions during the school holidays, Rhyme Time sessions for children and crafting sessions for adults.

service points. Whilst the Hub and Town libraries will retain a higher level of new stock, library stock remains on their shelves suitable for stock rotation and loan to single-staffed libraries and customers.

The library service will continue to purchase eBooks and eAudiobooks with Borrowbox by continuing to pay the financial contribution to the annual All-Wales Libraries eDigital Consortia.

reduction of £32,190 spend with both suppliers equates to £11,588 loss of book purchases, hence further reducing the number of new books on the library shelves.

LibraryLink Home Delivery Service have 70% of their customers on their delivery routes who can only read Large Print books. There are no mitigations that can be offered to replace the purchase of new Large Print books due to their unique offer and acquisition from specialist suppliers.

However there is currently a large existing stock available at all library branches, however it must be noted that over time, this 'on shelf' collection will reduce.

The library service can offer free Borrowbox Audiobooks and eBooks that may be listened to through a digital device. However, a high number of LibraryLink clients are elderly and have no access to a support network to help them set up and use a digital device. - These clients may also be digitally excluded and do not have access to WIFI or a digital device, although all libraries provide free WIFI and PC access

Children and adults who use library Audiobooks will retain the ability to loan these items from the other borough library sites. These items will not be deleted

from the system. An alternative method of listening to stories is offered through the free Borrowbox service, however a digital device and customer capability on which to download stories are required.

Children and adults who use library DVDs to watch films will retain the ability to loan these items from other borough library sites. These items will not be deleted from the system. An alternative method of watching films and cartoons is through streamed content through the home, however a subscription, digital device and customer capability to download and watch content is required.

Children who use the library to read for pleasure or to educate themselves will retain the ability to loan items from other borough library sites and strict guidance is in place on deciding if a book should be deleted from the system. The library service will

		continue to purchase suitable items throughout the year but can offer smaller quantities for loan. Library services will double check existing children and young adult stock against the Welsh Curriculum subject requested from schools. These titles will be at a premium and can only be loaned to children who visit the library – small stock collections for

Library services offer free bi-lingual reading information on a variety of health-related topics. Libraries are now viewed by health professionals as 'social subscribers' and offer free support, bi-lingual literature and books through the 'Reading Well' schemes <a href="https://readingagency.org.uk/adults/quick-guides/reading-well/">https://readingagency.org.uk/adults/quick-guides/reading-well/</a>.

A reduction of the funding impacts on the number of titles and promotional materials we can purchase for customers living with disabilities and long term conditions who are looking to help themselves and manage their health problems.

The proposal has a negative impact on the quantity of new Large Print and Audiobook stock that will be ordered for our elderly, vulnerable LibraryLink clients (Home Delivery service) who are unable to leave home due to life limiting or long-term illnesses. Less titles received equates to less choice for all LibraryLink and visitors to the static libraries who read this specialist type of font and listen to stories caused from a visual impairment.

There are no mitigations that can be offered to replace the purchase of Large Print books due to their unique offer and acquisition from specialist suppliers, however there is a large existing lending stock.

The library service can offer free Borrowbox Audiobooks and eBooks that may be listened to through a digital device. However, a high number of LibraryLink The proposal has a negative impact for children who use Audiobooks as a method of listening to stories and will affect children with a visual impairment or neurodivergent and find reading text difficult.

The Library Service partner with many health and well-being organisations-MIND, NHS Wales Mental Health Team, Community Neuro Group to name just three. Our extensive health and well-being collections are signposted to by the partners and provide fantastic self-reading support that will be impacted on the number of titles we can feasibly purchase.

The Caerphilly Library Service
Dementia Action Plan remains as
relevant a document in 2024 as the
day it was written in 2018. Support to
residents and carers living with
dementia is vital. The attached
document highlights our aspirations
and actions which now require suitable
funding in order to refresh library
stock, products and our Dementia
offer.

clients are elderly and have no access to a support network to help them set up and use a digital device. - These clients may also be digitally excluded and do not have access to WIFI or a digital device, although all libraries provide free WIFI and PC access.

There are no mitigations that can be offered to continue to support and extend and improve the Dementia offer unless we can continue the projects via grant funding. However, the library will continue to purchase new book stock, albeit in less quantities.

The proposal has a low-level, negative impact on our Welsh language offer. Ensuring consistency to all stock genres, the Children's Welsh expenditure lines will be reduced by £2k. This leads to fewer Welsh language titles used to educate or for reading for pleasure will be purchased and made available to residents and schools. However, this reduction is proportionate to the reduction across all stock.

A reduction on the purchase of Welsh language titles will affect our ability to meet WPLSQI 10 – Welsh Language Resources. The indicator is designed to ensure materials in Welsh are provided in line with local requirements and the socio-demographic characteristics of the population. Since the induction of the 1st Welsh Public Library Standards Framework in 2002, Caerphilly Library Service have met this WPLSQI or similar Welsh language standard.

The library will continue to purchase new Welsh language book stock, albeit in less quantities.

The library Resource Budget has been reduced by 45% over the past 14 years in order to help to meet the MTFP pressures facing the authority: £429,000 – 2008/2009

£275,000 - 2019/2020

£235,000 - 2023/2024

£2,000 will be deducted from the Children's Welsh language budget.



Caerphilly Library Service CIPFA+ Scores – A reduction to the budget may impact on the excellent customer service CIPFA+ scores the library service reports to the Welsh Government and Education DPA. During the 2019 survey (next survey due in 2023) we improved in 3 of the 4 categories in the Adult Survey compared to the survey of May 2017. These relate to: customers who believe the library has helped them develop new skills (increase of 1%), customers who have found helpful information for health and well-being (increase of 5%) and the number of customers who believe the library has made a difference to their lives (increase of 3%). Adult users are highly satisfied that the library is an enjoyable, safe and inclusive place to visit and this figure remains the same at 99%.
