



21st Century Schools Plans

Ambitious plans have been developed by Caerphilly County Borough Council to improve education provision across the area and build new schools that are fit for the 21st Century.

A major consultation exercise is currently underway to seek views on 'Phase 1' of the council's Secondary Rationalisation Programme which relates to the Islwyn West region.

Phase 1 will focus on Blackwood, Oakdale and Pontllanfraith Comprehensive Schools. Under the proposals, a new school will replace Oakdale and Pontllanfraith so that Islwyn West will then be served by Blackwood and the new school. The Council has secured funding of £20 million to deliver this exciting project which will include a review of catchment areas.

Cllr Rhianon Passmore, CCBC cabinet member for education said, "These are very exciting plans for the future of education in the area. If they are agreed, pupils will be able to enjoy top class educational facilities in modern, fit for purpose buildings."

"I'm sure local parents and the wider community will welcome the news and recognise the exciting opportunity this presents for pupils now and in the future."

The council submitted a programme of school building improvements to the Welsh Government in 2011 as part of its '21st Century Schools' funding bid. The Welsh Government is providing £26m and this amount is being matched by the council. It is expected that the funding will be made available over a five year period from 2014.

Another key part of the 21st Century School programme is to enhance Welsh medium provision within the county borough. Previously there was only one Welsh secondary school in the area - Ysgol Gyfun Cwm Rhymini in Fleur de Lis. The council is now developing the former St Ilan Comprehensive site in Caerphilly as an exciting new Welsh medium school called Y Gwyndy.

2013 - A year of achievements!

Over the past 12 months there have been many positive developments across the county borough and these are helping to bring real benefits to our communities. Here are just a few examples of these success stories.

Cleaner and greener

- We continue to lead the way in Wales with a Recycling Rate of **60.44%** (April – Sept 2013).
- Our waste management team scooped **5** prestigious national awards in 2013.
- **76** Schools signed up to taking part in a new Battery Recycling Initiative.
- **61** have also become Eco Schools by proudly displaying a 'Green Flag'.

Transport

- Around **14,000** Households targeted to take part in a Personalised Travelling Planning service.
- **1,523** schoolchildren completed Kerbcraft lessons in 2012/13 academic year to improve road safety awareness.
- **8,906** carriageway potholes filled and **70.9km** of roads resurfaced.



A safer place to live

- **31%** reduction in instances of police recorded anti-social behaviour for 2012/13.
- **64%** of respondents to the 2013 Household Survey agreed that the council and police are dealing with crime and anti-social behaviour.
- **438** fixed penalty notices issued for dog fouling and littering offences (compared with 159 the previous year).

Boost for tourism

- Blackwood Stute - The refurbishment of the Blackwood Institute is nearing completion. The cost of the improvements will total nearly **£1 million** that has transformed both the external and internal appearance of this popular arts facility.
- **220,000** Visitors to Cwmcarn Fforest Drive visitor centre with a new cross country and downhill cycle trail planned.



Improving Caerphilly Homes

Blue Badges Improving our service

The council is improving the way it deals with applications for Blue Badges in order to make the service more efficient for local people.

From Monday 6th January 2014 all applications must be made in person before a Blue Badge request can be considered for approval. This will ensure that improved assessments can be carried out and Blue Badges are only issued to people who qualify.

Eligible residents will be able to visit any of the council's Customer Services sites - including our new site in Caerphilly which opens on 6th January.

An appointments system will be introduced to help reduce waiting times and ensure customers who require an assessment have a choice of time and location to suit them.

Scrap metal dealers targeted

As part of a national day of action, Gwent Police and Caerphilly Country Borough Council teamed up on Thursday 5th December to target metal theft and raise awareness of the new licensing legislation for scrap metal dealers.



The new Scrap Metal Dealers Act 2013, that came into force in October this year means that dealers, when applying for a licence from the local authority, will have to prove they are a suitable person before they are issued with one.

Collectors will be issued with a licence that contains a current photograph of the holder and a copy will need to be displayed in any vehicle used. A dealer who holds a site licence must display a copy at each site identified in the licence. In all cases, dealers must keep records of transactions for three years.

The day of action saw scrap metal dealers stopped across Abercarn and, while the focus was raising awareness of the new legislation, the dealers were also checked that they complied with the Scrap Metal Dealers Act 2013.

Targeting metal theft is a Force priority for Gwent Police and, as such, in April 2011 Operation Ignite - a Gwent specific operation - was established, it later became part of a national initiative called Operation Tornado. Throughout the operation Gwent Police worked in partnership with various agencies including VOSA, Department for Work and Pensions, British Transport Police, Trading Standards, Environmental Health and HMRC.

Leading the operation, Sergeant Simon Clark explains: "This day of action highlights that along with our partner agencies we are still disrupting this type of criminal activity in Caerphilly and across Gwent. Metal theft is declining in the Caerphilly Local Policing area but we will continue to target the criminals involved in the theft of scrap metal."

Cllr David Poole, Caerphilly County Borough Council's Cabinet Member for Community & Leisure Services, said: "I'm delighted to see that this collaborative operation has been a success in reinforcing the message that scrap metal dealers and site operators must hold the correct permits/licences and keep accurate records. This is another great example of the rewards of partnership working, and our Trading Standards and Environmental Health teams will continue to work with Gwent Police to tackle crime in the county borough."

RESULTS INCLUDED:

- 1 person arrested for non-payment of a fine.
- 2 vehicles seized for using red diesel - the vehicle owners will now face a fine.
- 2 loads of scrap metal seized.
- 3 people reported for failing to keep records, contrary to the Scrap Metal Dealers Act 2013.
- 9 Prohibitions by VOSA - defects found in vehicles which saw the immediate recovery or roadside repairs on all vehicles before being allowed back on to the road. (1 vehicle had 14 defects and was in such a dangerous condition it was scrapped by the owner).
- 8 Fixed Penalty Tickets issued - for traffic offences such as failing to wear a seatbelt.
- 5 referrals made to the Department of Work and Pensions for benefit offences.
- 20 motorists breathalysed - all provided a negative result.
- 3 people interviewed in relation to waste issues.
- 2 people issued with warning letters in relation to the use of loudspeakers in the street.
- 1 person had their waste (including scrap) removed.



A day in the life of...

An Adult Placement/Shared Lives Worker



As an Adult Placement Shared Lives Worker, Sam supports approved adult carers who support vulnerable adults with a range of needs, helping them to live active lives in their communities.

The South East Wales Adult Placement Shared Lives Scheme, which works across the counties of Caerphilly, Blaenau Gwent, Newport, Torfaen, Monmouthshire and Merthyr Tydfil, offers three main services: long term care, respite care and sessional support.

This is how Sam supports Adult Placement Carers in the community or from their own home on an average day:

8.30am "I arrive at work and check through my emails, look through any outstanding paperwork and check my to-do list. I check in with my line manager to discuss my workload and any issues. I also spend time assessing my schedule, and rearranging any meetings that have to be cancelled due to emergency appointments.

9.30am Today I'm going over an annual carer review. I've already completed visits with the carers to gather the information; the review summarises the work that has been carried out by the carer over the year supporting vulnerable adults. This review will be taken to an Independent Adult Placement Panel, made up of professionals from across the six local authority areas.

12.30am After an early lunch at my desk and preparing paperwork for my afternoon visits, I'm out on the road for a contact visit with an Adult Placement Carer who provides sessional support in the Blackwood area. We discuss the people they support in the community using the care support plan we have previously put together. I also check that the service users are being supported to meet their agreed service plan outcomes, this could be anything from completing a shopping list to cooking a healthy meal. We then discuss any actions or concerns they may have, and I will take these to the appropriate Care Management Team or health professional.

3pm I'm back on the road again, picking up a respite and long-term adult placement carer for a network meeting in Newport. We're joined by the service user, education staff, support workers and the person's social worker. Following this review I will take the service user and carer back home, and pop back to the office one last time to check my emails before heading home at around 6pm.

It's a very rewarding job and we get to meet all sorts of people from across South East Wales; we support vulnerable adults with a range of needs including mental health problems, physical disabilities, drug and alcohol issues, people with learning disabilities and older people living in our communities. Our carers come from all backgrounds, from recently married 20-somethings to older people who want to open up their home to help someone.

The main thing I love about my job is making a difference to someone's life. In my role I'm not offering front line support for service users, but I'm supporting the adult placement carers to help our service users make positive changes, develop new skills, engage in new activities and be involved in their community."

New cycle route gives town pedal power

Cyclists are being encouraged to get on their saddles and pedal a new cycle route running through Rhymney.

The new cycle track completes a route from Rhymney Comprehensive School to the National cycle network at the Head of the Rhymney Valley. The completion of this section of the Rhymney Valley Linear Route will provide greater opportunities to walk and cycle for local journeys and to access the Rhymney Railway Station for longer distance travel.

The scheme is funded by the Welsh Government's Regional Transport Consortia Grant and was delivered by Caerphilly County Borough Council's Engineering Services Division. The improvement will help local children use a safe route to school and adopt a healthy lifestyle. The cycle track provision in the area can now be accessed by pupils from all nearby schools along the route these including Abertysswg Primary School, Pontlottyn Primary School, Bryn Awel Primary School, Ysgol y Lawnt, Upper Rhymney Primary School and Rhymney Comprehensive School.

Cllr Tom Williams, Caerphilly County Borough Council's Cabinet Member for Highways, Transportation & Engineering, said, "Ensuring that our children can travel safely to school is of utmost importance and this new track will enable pupils attending schools along the route to make a hazard free passage to school whether they are walking or cycling. I hope the whole community embraces this new route as a healthy and environmentally-friendly way of travelling the local area."

Flagship sports centre progress

An exciting project to construct a top class sports facility in Ystrad Mynach is taking shape.

Caerphilly County Borough Council's new £6.8m Rugby/Football Centre of Excellence, which features 3G rugby and football pitches and a gymnasium, is currently being developed on the site of the former Ystrad Mynach Hospital.

The first phase of the project to demolish the former hospital buildings at the site has been completed, while the construction of two grandstands, the formation of new rugby and football pitches and the building of changing facilities, a conditioning suite and community facility have already commenced.

It is expected that the 3G rugby pitch will be laid in the New Year,



with construction of the 3G football pitch expected to follow soon after.

As part of the usage proposals for the complex, key partners such as Gwent Dragons, Welsh Rugby Union (WRU) and Cardiff City Football Club will share use of the facility during the day between Monday and Friday, while community clubs will have use of the Rugby/Football Centre of Excellence in the evenings and at weekends.

Cllr David Poole, Caerphilly County Borough Council's Cabinet Member for Community & Leisure Services, said, "The new Rugby/Football Centre of Excellence is really going to put Caerphilly county borough on the map as a top destination for high class sports facilities. It can only benefit our local, regional and national teams to have a superb facility like this on our doorstep."

Air quality - Have your say!

Residents are being invited to take part in a consultation about air quality in Caerphilly town centre.

In September 2008, an area in Caerphilly town centre was designated as an 'Air Quality Management Area' after higher than normal levels of nitrogen dioxide (a traffic related pollutant) were monitored in the area.

More recently, other areas in and around Caerphilly town centre have also shown nitrogen dioxide levels above the normal level, and in November last year, the 'Air Quality Management Area' was extended to also include parts of Nantgarw Road and Ton-y-Felin Road.

An air quality 'action plan' has been developed, and the council is calling on residents to have their say on this important document.



Plans in place for Winter!

The council's grit supplies have been fully stocked – at 10,000 tonnes – so that we are well prepared to tackle any severe snow and ice problems throughout the winter months.

In addition to the 10,000 tonnes of salt in storage, the council also has more than 800 salt bins located across the county borough, which have already been filled ready for the winter.

The council is has also recently taken delivery of two new gritters, to supplement its fleet, which now stands at 13 gritters ready for the winter. The council's highways network totals over 1,150 kilometres. A standard gritting run covers 485 kilometres on 9 gritting routes. When circumstances arise, the council has 54 trained personnel available using 13 specialist vehicles.

Each standard gritting run uses around 80 tonnes of salt, and in times of severe weather, the council can use up to 400 tonnes per day.

Supporting our Armed Forces

Various organisations that represent communities across Caerphilly county borough have pledged to support local Armed Forces communities as members of the Caerphilly county borough Armed Forces Community Covenant Forum.

Last year, organisations including the Council, Gwent Police, Aneurin Bevan University Health Board, GAVO, Wales Probation Trust and other organisations including the Royal British Legion and SSAFA signed the Caerphilly county borough Armed Forces Community Covenant, a voluntary agreement of mutual support between the Caerphilly county borough civilian community and its Armed Forces community.

Caerphilly county borough's designated Armed Forces Community Covenant partners are the 203 (Welsh) Field Hospital, who are currently on active service in Afghanistan.

The Armed Forces Community Covenant is underpinned by the daily work of the Council and its partner agencies to deliver and protect frontline services for those Armed Forces personnel (both serving and veterans) who need them the most.

Members of the Armed Forces community are now also able to access free swimming at all of the council's leisure centres' public swim sessions and are eligible for discount on Leisure membership.

Any customer who can provide proof of current service (including reservists) with the Armed Forces or proof that they are in receipt of a war pension or are a veteran, and are a Smartcard holder, can attend all public swim and aquatic classes in swimming pools for FREE and sign up for membership at their local Leisure Centre for a reduced price across the county borough.

Projects that bring the local community and Armed Forces communities together are also being encouraged to apply for a funding grant. The Armed Forces Community Covenant Grant Scheme, administered by the Ministry of Defence, makes money available to projects that strengthen the ties between members of the local Armed Forces community and the wider community in which they live.

Annual Performance Report

The performance of Caerphilly County Borough Council for 12/13 has been documented in a report which shows how the Council has performed against the priorities it set itself, service performance and how it compares against other local authorities.

Positively, six of the Council's eight improvement objectives for 2012/13 were successfully delivered, while work to improve skill levels for children and young people was partially successful. Work to enhance citizen engagement fell behind schedule within the year, but outstanding work in this area has been completed since.

Performance against other authorities has been mixed. Of the 44 indicators used to create the national picture of performance, 13 of those indicators put the Council in the 'upper quartile' of Welsh local authorities, with the same number of indicators putting the Authority in the 'lower quartile' in Wales.

Night shelter scheme

A scheme that sees the council work with local churches to support rough sleepers is to return for a second year. Seven Churches in the Blackwood and Caerphilly areas will open their doors as part of The Caerphilly Churches Night Shelter initiative.

The scheme commences from Monday 6th January 2014 and runs through until 27th March. Each church will be able to accommodate a maximum of six people and doors will open at 7.00pm, offering rough sleepers a warm meal, a safe place of rest and breakfast in the morning before leaving. Rough sleepers must be referred and cannot arrive unannounced. Referrals must be received by 4pm each afternoon to the Housing Advice Centre.

The council's Public Protection team aims to ensure that the county borough is a healthy, safe and fair place for people to live, work & visit. One of the team's key tasks is to expose and bring before the courts those individuals and businesses we discover acting illegally.
