Cllr David Poole, the long-standing ward member for Pengam and former Deputy Leader of the Council, has been elected as the new Leader of the authority.


The appointment was announced at the recent Annual Meeting of Council and follows May's local election result which saw Labour retain control of the council with a total of 50 seats. Plaid Cymru took 18 seats and the Independents have 5 seats.

The selection of a new Leader was required due to the sad passing of the former Leader of Council, Cllr Keith Reynolds.

Objectives Published

The council has recently published its Wellbeing Objectives for the forthcoming year.

Every year, the council agrees a set of Wellbeing Objectives, which are priorities to help to the council improve lives and communities across the area.

The objectives are:

- To help people make the best use of their household income and manage their debts.
- To improve outcomes for all learners, with a particular focus on those vulnerable to underachievement.
- To promote the benefits of an active and healthy lifestyle.
- To take steps to reduce the council's carbon footprint and inform and assist others within the borough to do the same.
- To take steps to ensure the physical standard and condition of our housing stock be improved and maintained to the Welsh Housing Quality Standard (WHQS), helping to improve the quality of life for the people who live in those homes.

Council Leader Cllr David Poole said, "Having these objectives does not stop us from carrying out and trying to improve the many things we already do, but they are helpful to prioritise areas that will improve our residents' quality of life in a sustainable way. We'll review these objectives later on in the year to make sure they remain current and are what our communities want."

Air quality - Have your say

Residents are invited to contribute their views to a consultation about air quality in Hafodyrynys.

Air quality monitoring in Hafodyrynys began in 2009, and following a detailed assessment of air quality, part of Hafodyrynys Road was designated as an 'Air Quality Management Area' in November 2013 after higher than normal levels of nitrogen dioxide (a traffic related pollutant) were present in the area.

The council, with its partners, and taking into account feedback gained so far from local residents, has developed a draft Air Quality Action Plan which contains some key ideas and outline proposals aimed at reducing levels of nitrogen dioxide within the area. Residents are being encouraged to give their views on the contents of this important document.

Cllr Eluned Stenner said, "With the support of the local community and our partners, we remain fully committed to doing all we can to help improve the air quality situation, and I'd encourage our residents to contribute their views on the contents of this draft action plan taking part in this consultation."

We can all do our bit to help reduce pollution and help improve air quality. **Some simple tips include:**

- Avoid using a car for short journeys where possible.
- Avoid revving the car engine unnecessarily.
- Avoid allowing the car to idle where possible, only start the engine when ready to move off.
- Why not give public transport a go?
- Avoid burning materials of any kind.

School facilities for the future

It's full steam ahead for a number of ambitious school development projects across Caerphilly county borough.

The coming weeks will see pupils and teachers move into their brand new £25.5 million Islwyn High School. The impressive three storey building, creatively designed by the council's Building Consultancy Team, is to become the permanent home for pupils of the former Pontllanfraith and Oakdale Comprehensive Schools.

Contractors Wilmott Dixon handed the keys to the brand new school development over to Headteacher Tim Williams recently, with pupil ambassadors having been at the forefront of the building process, visiting the site regularly to update their peers on the progress.



Pupil Ambassador Daniel Greenway said, "It's fantastic to see the building finished. We have been really lucky coming to see it at different stages and it was hard to imagine how it would look but it has all come together. I think all of the pupils will like the design."

The school has impressive features such as modern teaching spaces, state of the art technology workshops, science labs and IT suites spread across three floors. The outdoor space boasts a 3G pitch and multi-use games area, as well as outdoor learning spaces and an amphitheatre.

Headteacher Tim Williams said, "To say we are excited to reach this stage is an understatement. We have been gearing up to merge the schools and move for a long time. I have been to the site so many times, so I feel like I know the layout inside out; however I feel it will truly become a school when all of our pupils arrive. The teaching spaces and outdoor facilities are first class, and it will be a pleasure to see them in use."

Works also continue at quite a pace on the construction of a state-of-the-art replacement primary school in the Upper Rhymney Valley. The £8 million development, which is being funded jointly by the council and Welsh Government through its 21st Century Schools and

Education Programme, will provide pupils from Abertysswg and Pontlottyn Primary Schools with a modern facility which is expected to open in January 2018.

Contractor Wilmott Dixon is progressing work on the development site, which is located next to Rhymney Comprehensive School. The single storey development will consist of a primary school, a nursery and a Flying Start unit. The school will also benefit from an external grassed area for infants and junior with play equipment, a gravelled zone including a planting area for a garden club and an amphitheatre for outdoor teaching and events.

The school will also boast an 'Integrated Children's Centre' offering childcare provision. This is expected to support Flying Start part time places, as well as deliver 'wraparound' and afterschool provision for working parents and to help support economically inactive parents to return to work.



Blackwood Comprehensive School is also currently working with the council on a two-year improvement project, funded by 21st Century Schools. This exciting project will see vast improvements made to the school buildings and facilities in order to provide pupils and teachers with a fit for purpose environment for teaching and learning.

Over the length of the project, six science labs will be refurbished, as will

the schools main hall with a new roof and windows replacing the original metal ones. Also on the cards is the renewal of the windows, doors and roof of the gym and changing areas. Investing in 21st century technology will also be a key element of the project, with an ICT group having already been convened to work to embed digital competency within the school, ensuring pupils are digitally literate, not only for the present but for the future too.

Another area which will see a major overhaul will be the kitchen/dining areas - currently the school has two dining areas, which seat approximately 250 pupils. Plans are being drawn up to join the two rooms, providing much needed space.

Cllr Philippa Marsden commented, "We continue to deliver significant investment in school projects, which will be of huge benefit to our pupils and teachers for many years to come. These projects will provide our pupils with cutting edge facilities and modern teaching spaces which will really enhance their learning experience. I greatly look forward to seeing these works - and others - progress over the coming months."

The 6.2 mile course will lead participants in and around Caerphilly town centre, with the start and finishing line located on Crescent Road, set against the backdrop of Caerphilly Castle. A number of road closures and traffic restrictions will need to be put in place between 7.00am and 1.00pm in order to allow the event to run safely. Every effort will be made to re-open roads as soon as it is safe to do so, but it is inevitable that there will be some disruption in and around the town centre.

Residents are urged to take note, and motorists planning to travel through the area on the morning of **Sunday 18th June** should use alternative means. The Bryn Meadows Caerphilly 10k is open to participants of all abilities aged 15 and over. Registration costs £18.50 per person for unaffiliated entrants and £16.50 for affiliated club/welsh athletics entrants and concessions. Entrants must be at least 15 years of age on the day of the event to participate.

In 2016/17 £5.1 million was invested into affordable housing in the Caerphilly county borough through Welsh Government's **Social Housing Grant Programme.**

These include developments on the sites of former Fire Stations in Bargoed and Cefn Fforest. As well as creating a new use for these sites, the homes are being developed as part of Welsh Government's Smaller Properties Programme; aimed at helping those who need to downsize as a direct result of the "bedroom tax".

There are also a number of affordable housing sites currently under development in the county borough, including the former Navigation School in Crumlin and Oakdale Hotel, located in the centre of the former mining village.

Making a house a home



Care homes and day centres across the county borough have revolutionised the way they deliver care thanks to the Dementia Care Matters model.

The 'Butterfly' model shifts the focus for care workers from task allocation, targets and efficiencies and creates a culture conducive to person-centred care. This involves an importance placed on people's emotional wellbeing, identity and creating a sense of belonging within the residential home.

Residents are now able to contribute to the running of their home, which includes preparing meals and taking part in domestic chores, typical of that in a 'normal' home life.

Creating a home environment has been vital to the successful implementation of the care model creating a familiar and comforting environment for those who use and live in the facilities.

Cabinet Member Cllr Carl Cuss said, "Embracing Dementia Care Matters has had an enormously positive impact on the way we deliver care. The once clinical facilities have become comfortable and welcoming homes and staff have become more than carers they are friends to those who need it most. We are proud to have embraced the model and will continue to learn and strive to deliver the highest quality care."

Boost for inward investm

The council has welcomed recent decisions by a number of major businesses to invest in the county borough and locate their operations within the area.

The BBI Group, based in Oakdale, is to centralise its operations at fantastic news one major site within the county borough as part of a £8.5 million for our local investment programme supported economy by Welsh Government. As well as safeguarding existing jobs, the announcement will also see the workforce increase from 180 to 366 by 2020. The firm offers a range of products and services that are provided to the diagnostic, healthcare, research, defence and food industries.

In Rhymney, a major biotech company is creating 73 jobs as it moves to a new European HQ in the town. Sharp Clinical Services (UK) is expanding and investing £9.5m in a new base that will see staff numbers double.

Leading manufacturer, IG Doors, is also

investing in the county borough by building a new 18,000 square metre factory on a 25 acre site at Oakdale. The prestigious development, which has financial backing from Welsh Government, will bring new jobs to the area and is a welcome new addition to Oakdale

Business Park site. Chris Burns, CCBC's Interim Chief Executive said, "This is fantastic news for our local economy and is also a major vote of confidence in the Caerphilly county borough as a key strategic location for inward investment."

SINGLE PERSON COUNCIL TAX REVIEW

The council has recently carried out a review of residents receiving a 25% discount on their council tax.

Single Person Discount (SPD) is claimed when an adult is the sole occupant of a property. Earlier this year, the council wrote to some residents asking them to confirm their current circumstances. This gave residents the

opportunity to notify the council if there had been a change in their circumstances. As a result, the total amount being awarded as Single Person Discount has reduced by £184,000 because more than one adult is now living in the household.

Cllr Barbara Jones said, "We continually review the amount of council tax payable by each household, and would encourage residents to tell us of any household changes straight away."



Caerphilly is one of six local councils to pilot the Welsh Government three and four year childcare offer for parents working more than 16 hours per week.

If your child is aged three or four and you live in one of the following areas; Argoed, Blackwood, Cefn Fforest, Crumlin, Newbridge, Pengam, Penmaen or Pontllanfraith you could be entitled to up to 20 free hours of childcare in addition to the 10 hours already provided by the Foundation Phase. For nine weeks of the year, outside of term time, parents will be able to access 30 hours of childcare.

The pilot area has sufficient existing childcare provision as well as a large number of primary schools, (both English and Welsh medium) offering Foundation Phase nursery provision. Parents who live in the pilot areas are able to choose any registered childcare setting that suits their personal and family circumstance, whether inside or outside of county in agreement with the provider and the local authority. The childcare does not have to be delivered by the same provider as the Foundation Phase provision. Eligibility checks and the application form are available on the Caerphilly website www.caerphilly.gov.ul for children going to part time Foundation Phase in September 2017.


Another boost for recycling efforts

Residents are being thanked for their recycling efforts - but are also being reminded that there's still more work to do!

Latest figures show that 65.65% (*awaiting verification) of all Caerphilly county borough waste is now being recycled or composted, which is already surpassing the Welsh Government target which councils must meet by 2019/20 of 64%. Monitoring of food waste recycling participation has also shown a 9% increase when compared to figures from the same period in 2016.

Here in Caerphilly county borough we're doing very well, but there is still lots more to be done. The council has recently invested in a new fleet of specialist collection vehicles. The 'twin pack' vehicles now allow for the separation of food and garden waste within the same vehicle so they can be treated separately.

Food waste is now treated using the Welsh Government's preferred method - a process called Anaerobic Digestion, which is a cleaner method and results in the generation of electricity. Garden waste continues to be composted. This system is expected to generate annual savings for the council of over £345,000.



From here, targeted campaigns can be carried out to support those households who don't currently recycle, with guidance and support to those residents who may need extra assistance in order to recycle. Appropriate

enforcement action against those who don't recycle – or those who place incorrect items in their bins - is very much a last resort, but may be used in future if necessary.

Cllr Nigel George said, "With the ongoing support of our residents we can, I'm sure, continue to be among the best performing areas in Wales when it comes to our recycling efforts."


John Bevan is new Mayor
